THEY are a special group of everyday Australians, united by a bond of compassion, bravery and true heroism and their selfless acts have inspired a nation.

Chosen from more than 70 finalists from across the country, Australia's greatest unsung heroes yesterday received the recognition they deserved at the 8th annual Pride of Australia national medal award ceremony during a gala ceremony at Sydney's Sheraton on the Park.

Among them were cerebral palsy sufferer Daniel Clarke and his younger brother William, who have raised more than \$650,000 to save the natural habitat of Borneo's orang-utans.

The NSW brothers, awarded the Environment medal, have also created their own book, which is used in many of the state's schools, and have lobbied politicians.

They also won the Toyota People's Choice Award chosen by you, our readers taking home \$10,000 cash plus another \$10,000 for charity.

Also from NSW is Georgina Kenaghan, who was awarded the Inspiration medal for her dedication to coaching the country's female Paralympic goalball team.

Ms Kenaghan put a career in psychology on hold to help the six inspiring blind women qualify for the Games for the first time in 16 years.

MICHAEL Wilson's job was to save lives.

As one of the state's most skilled paramedics, he rescued people from the most perilous situations every day.

This meant laying his own life on the line as he dangled from helicopters or jumped into raging seas to reach people in their greatest hour of need.

The father-of-three knew the risks of his job and didn't do it for accolades – he just wanted to help others.

On Christmas Eve, while his family was at home preparing for the following day's festivities, Mr Wilson died trying to rescue a canyoner injured near Carrington Falls on the south coast.
