Orang-utan talk inspires students

A SPECIAL visit has inspired Craigieburn youths to branch out and help save the world's remaining orang-utans.

Sydney brothers Daniel Clarke, 17, and William Clarke, 15, have become renowned for their passion to both save the animals from extinction and motivate kids to make a difference in their own communities.

Daniel, who has cerebral palsy, used his Starlight Foundation wish to save the Borneo orang-utans, with the pair raising more than \$705,000 so far.

They visited Our Lady's Primary School in Craigieburn recently, presenting a number of sessions for the students and class leaders.

Religious education leader Mary McCormick said the students were captivated learning about the boys' passion and motivation.

"Our focus was on ... orang-utans and saving (them), but it was more on the fact that kids could make a difference," she said.

"Their job is to go back to their classrooms and to keep the discussion going."

Ms McCormick said the boys had struck a chord with the students, some of whom had already donated money to adopt an orang-utan and sorted out unused clothes to give away.

His younger brother said it was amazing to see kids understanding the message, and was grateful that the school had welcomed them.
